

Did Jesus Really Live? And if He Did, Why Does it Matter?

The website *Aeon* claims to publish articles promoting "profound and provocative thinking" and asking "big questions" that pursue "fresh answers." In other words, they are the smart people. The rest of us account for the tribes of the unenlightened.

And on February 15, Aeon published an article with the provocative title, "There Was No Jesus." The author, Gavin Evans, is an atheist from the UK. In his essay he recycles the tired notion that the story of Jesus is a fabricated myth which people of faith cling to out of ignorance, despite evidence to the contrary.

Is there evidence of Jesus?

To support his contention, Evans examines what he perceives as a lack of evidence that a man named Jesus lived in the Middle East of the first century. He criticizes every other view, including the popular liberal position that Jesus lived, but He was different from the "Christ of faith."

But Evans relies on worn out atheist

cliches that illustrate a common ignorance of historical documents, the people of history, the nature of religion, and which barely hold water when compared to the evidence for the life of Jesus. Evans' purpose is to pontificate rather than argue a rational point.

I won't take space to answer each of Evans' points. For that, you can watch this video, entitled "Did Jesus Exist?," for an excellent rebuttal by Christian apologist and theologian Dr. Mike Licona.

Instead, I want to park on one point, and that is the main reason that people like Evans would even try to dispute the existence of history's most famous figure. See, if you admit that Jesus lived, then you are obligated to decide who He was. And to do that, you are required to account for His death and resurrection.

Believing in Jesus is a reasonable conclusion based on evidence, experience, and the facts of history. Jesus not only lived. Jesus rose from the grave and changed the world.

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Paul and the Aeon of His Day

Remember when Paul entered the city of Athens? The Bible says that "he was deeply distressed when he saw that the city was full of idols" (Acts 17:16). So, he "reasoned" with the Jews in the synagogue and people in the marketplace, explaining the story of Jesus and, especially, His resurrection. His rational arguments for the resurrection of Christ captured the attention of philosophers, who invited Paul to their speaker's forum, called the Areopagus (Acts 17:17-19).

In the book of Acts, Paul's conversations are often characterized as "reasoning" with people who are unbelievers (for instance, Acts 17:17, 18:4). Other times he is described as "persuading," "debating," or "discussing." All portray Paul engaged in thoughtful and rational discussions, like the conversation that took place at the Areopagus.

The Areopagus was a group of philosophers and people with similar interests that gathered at Mars Hill in Athens for the sole purpose of talking about new ideas (17:21). That is to say, it was like the Aeon of the ancient world.

They were anxious to hear from Paul. He began his message to them by laying the foundation, "Paul stood in the middle of the Areopagus and said, 'People of Athens! I see that you are extremely religious in every respect. For as I was passing through and observing the objects of your worship, I even found an altar on which was inscribed, 'To an Unknown God.' Therefore, what you worship in ignorance, this I proclaim to you'" (Acts 17:22-23).

And then Paul proclaimed Christ as the one true God that the Athenians had been searching for. People were attentive and listened to his ideas. But when he came to the resurrection, the mood changed. The time for passive listening was over. Decisions had to be made. If Jesus was alive, academic neutrality was no longer an option.

The Bible says that some complained and ridiculed Paul, some wanted to hear more, and some believed in Christ. But one thing is certain. From that moment, no one who was at Mars Hill that day could remain neutral to the story of Jesus.

Because He Lives

The Christian faith is a reasonable conclusion if the evidence for Christ is rightly considered. And the evidence is stacked in favor of the resurrection.

For instance, if Jesus did not rise from the dead, how do we explain the transformation of the apostles? Only hours before they claimed to have seen Him alive, they were hidden in an upper room, huddled in fear. And yet, suddenly they were out in the streets preaching His resurrection? How do you explain that unless they had actually seen Him alive?



And considering that the apostles began preaching the gospel so soon after the resurrection, any fabrication could have been easily debunked. Anyone could have visited the tomb and seen that it was still sealed, or they could have produced the body and exposed the lies of the apostles. If the disciples of Jesus were lying, it would have been foolish to begin preaching His resurrection in full view of the tomb.

But their changed lives, and their boldness in preaching, are just two examples of early evidence that Jesus rose from the grave.

No neutrality

If writers like Evans show us anything, it's that discussions about Jesus are still unavoidable. Even ardent skeptics find it hard to dismiss history's most influential Person.

But when listeners are confronted with the resurrection, they have to make a decision. It's the non-negotiable of the gospel message (Rom. 10:9-10, 1 Cor. 15:3-5). Neutrality is no longer an option.

Jesus didn't come so that we could have more information about God, or so that we could be more religious. He came to provide life to those who believe (John 11:25). And once we are confronted with that, we have to make a decision about Jesus.

If He lived, He died. And if He died, He rose again. And that means He is alive today.

What do you believe?


